Dear Alabama A&M University Family,

For centuries, this nation has been plagued by unjust and unfair laws and policies that have adversely impacted communities of color. The inhumane and senseless murder of George Floyd and Ahmaud Arbery are yet, continued occurrences of a criminal justice system that has disproportionately impacted our communities nationwide. In the days since the unnecessary murder of Mr. Floyd, protestors have enacted their First Amendment rights and taken to streets and other public places around the world, including here in Huntsville, Alabama. Although the global protests are intended to be peaceful, some have resulted in rioting.
