Course Description

The course is designed to provide an applied foundation for understanding human sexuality and development. Students will examine the dynamics of various situations and developmental fundamentals on how human sexuality develops through family, cultural and society influences.

Course Objectives/Knowledge and Skill Outcomes

- 1. Understanding and applying counseling approaches to address sexuality and relationship concerns.
- 2. Develop skills for reflecting and connecting clients' narratives to sexual transactions, sexual experiences, sexual attitudes, and sexual identities.
- 3. Gain insight to diverse sexual values and expression
- 4. Demonstrate the appropriate skills conduct sexual history interviews and ask personal questions in a professional manner.
- 5. Gain insight into students' own values, beliefs, and decision-making techniques when working with sex/relationship issues.

- 6. Gain an understanding of the physical, psychological, and social aspects of sexual development and functioning.
- 7. Gain knowledge in the evaluation and treatment of sexual problems and will know when and how to properly refer clients to appropriate clinical treatment.

Assignments

1. Sexual values interviews

You may choose a partner from the class or outside of the class (a spouse, friend, family member, etc.) with which to conduct these interviews. All participants should be over the age of 18 and able to provide consent to be interviewed as adults about their sexuality. To maintain privacy, do not identify your partner by name or any other identifying features including the nature of your relationship to them.

Each week, you will conduct an interview session with the same partner covering a particular topic related to sexuality values (an interview guide will be provided). Sessions should be about 30 minutes each and aim for depth of understanding rather than surface level Q&A – this means you need to use your counseling skills to a) make your participant comfortable and able to disclose, as well as b) "dig deeper," and follow up your participants' responses with additional probing questions. You may record interviews (with consent) for your own reference, but you do not need to turn in recordings.

You will submit a 1–2-page summary paper each week describing what you learned about your participant. You should use a pseudonym to identify your participant (e.g. "John or Jane Doe" instead of their real name) in your weekly and final reports.

2. Sexuality Presentation

The final report you submit will be a reflection paper (aim for 6-8 pages) describing your experience of interviewing your participant. More information on what to specifically include in the final paper will be posted on Blackboard.

You will select a topic from a list or provide one of your own (pending approval) to create an informative video presentation. This is a 3-part assignment:

- 1. Literature review: Presentations should include at least five academic references (articles from reputable academic research journals stay off Google and USE THE LIBRARY). For each reference provide a) an APA formatted citation, b) the article abstract, and c) your thoughts about the article (about a paragraph or two). (20 Points)
- 2. Presentations will take the form of video recordings uploaded to Canvas (or accessible through a *working* link that can be viewed in the Firefox web-browser, posted in the indicated discussion thread). In the video, be sure to incorporate visual aspects at the very least you can include a power point with the share-screen option in zoom. For those of you a little more savvy in video production, feel free to get creative. (60 points)

3. Final Exam

The final exam in this course will consist of two parts, a) a multiple-choice test covering the entire course, and b) a short answer section.
